Key Learning

In 'Sikhi', spiritual teachers are known as 'gurus'. The first Sikh Guru and founder of Sikhi was Guru Nanak.

After a three-day disappearance, Guru Nanak returned and began to preach the Sikh faith. Sikhs believe there is only one God and that God is everywhere.

Sikhi was established by ten human Gurus. The Guru Granth Sahib is the sacred text of the Sikh religion and is known as the 'living Guru'.
